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Platinum Jubilee


We wanted to mark HM Queen Elizabeth's platinum jubilee with a range of collectable transferwares, but the modern output is generally pretty awful! We have selected one but supplemented it with some pieces from Queen Victoria's golden jubilee of 1887: a pair of plates with portraits within rope borders by an unknown maker (the 1837 plate on its own is often misidentified as an accession piece); a Worcester dinner plate in red (other colours are known); and a Deykin "Jubilee Tea Pot Stand" (after all, everything stops for tea in England!)














Mark Time

Initial marks can often be challenging, and the E. & Co. on this "Warwick Vase" pattern is a good example. The same pattern was made by Enoch Wood & Sons with the same mark except for their initials E.W. & S. Our first thought was El-



kins & Co., makers of the "Irish Scenery" series, but one other possibility might be Edgerton & Co. of Lane End, but their dates are c.1823-27 and surely this romantic style pattern would be later, mid-1830s or so? Any suggestions?

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Back in Recorder News 15 we showed six ornate jugs typical of the 1830s and here are four more: a purple pouch-shape jug in an unrecorded pattern "Grotto", with another example of different shape (pouch jugs are often attributed to Swansea with little justification); a fine brown Rogers jug in their "Athens" pattern (courtesy Peter Hyland); and a small purple jug marked with a Staffordshire knot and pattern number 8. The moulded rim on the latter is unusual and the body is also moulded with leaves and scrolls. Apart from the Rogers jug, none is of much quality, but they are decorative. Any more nice examples out there?

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
